CHAPTER 225

Special tax.

SEC. 28. Special taxes for the purchase of fire engines, or for the purchase of cemeteries, or for improving the same, for the burial of the dead, may be voted at any regular or special meeting of the voters. But no vote shall be taken unless such tax be first recommended by the said Trustees, and a notice of the same specifying the purpose for which said tax is to be raised, and the time and place for voting be published at least ten days before such meeting, by three or more handbills, put up in public places, by the Clerk, or in some newspaper published in said Village.

Assessors.

§ 29. The Assessor or Assessors elected or appointed by the provisions of this act, shall, in all things pertaining to their office, be governed by the same laws as Assessors of towns.

Duties of village officers.

§ 30. On the fourth Tuesday in May next, all connexions between the town of Macford and the Village of Markesan, for town purposes, shall be dissolved, and the duties now and hereafter imposed upon the Supervisors, and other officers of towns, shall be imposed on the officers of the Village of Markesan. And so much of the town of Macford as is not included in the limits of said Village, shall continue to constitute the town of Macford for the purpose of town and county government, and they shall at the next town meeting or election, fix their place of meeting, by a vote of the electors at the town meeting.

Funds, etc.

§ 31. After the fourth Tuesday of May next, the amount of funds remaining, or debts due, as the case may be, from said town as now constituted, shall be proportioned between said town and Village, according to the amount of property in each, as taken from the assessment roll.

Amendments.

§ 32. This act may be amended, altered or repealed, by the Legislature, but shall be considered a public act, and shall be in force from and after its passage. At all elections uncer this act, after the first, the President, and Clerk, and one Trustee, designated by the Trustees for that purpose, shall constitute a Board of Inspectors at such election.

CHAPTER 226.CHAPTER 226.

AN ACT to incorporate the Village of Kingston.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The inhabitants of the district of county included in the following limits and bounded as follows: All of section twenty four, all of section thirteen, east half of section fourteen, south half of section twelve, town fourteen north of range eleven east, and west half of section seven, town fourteen, north of range twelve east, in the town of Kingston, county of Marquette, and State of Wisconsin, are hereby created a body corporate and politic, by the name and style of the President and Trustees of the Village of Kingston, and by that name shall be capable of contracting and being contracted with, of suing and being sued, pleading and being impleaded, answering and being answered unto, in all courts and places, and in all matters whatsoever, with power of purchasing, receiving, holding, occupying and conveying real and personal estate; and shall have a common seal, and may change the same at pleasure, and shall be competent to have and exercise all the rights and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and obligations pertaining to a municipal corporation.

§ 2. The government of the said corporation and the exercise of its corporate powers, and management of its fiscal, prudential and municipal concerns, shall be vested in a President and four Trustees, and such other officers as hereinafter provided for.

§ 3. The elective officers of said corporation shall be one President, four Trustees, one Clerk, one Assessor, one Treasurer, one Marshal, and two Constables, to be elected by the qualified voters thereof at the annual election of said corporation, to be held on the third Monday of May in each and every year, and shall hold their respective offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. There shall be elected at the election described in this section, two Justices of the Peace, one of which shall hold his office for one year, and one for two years, which shall be determined by lot; and each and every year thereafter, one Justice of the Peace shall be elected, whose term of office shall be for two years.
